Concord, Aug. 6. - The Pullman works were re-opened this morning quietly, and with no demonstration made by any of the employees. Only 250 men reported for work although the company expected 800. About 1,000 strikers gathered around the building and good-naturedly chafed the returning workmen, but no attempt at violence was made. A heavy detail of police was on hand, and remained at the works all day.
