**SIR JOHN THOMPSON DEAD.**

Canada's Premier Dies Suddenly at London, England, Yesterday.

The news has just reached us, on the eve of going to press, that Sir John Thompson, Premier of the Dominion, died suddenly at Windsor Castle, London, yesterday morning. Particulars are meagre. A notice will appear at this news.

The duty of the formation of a new Government will now be necessary. It is probable the Governor-General will summon Hon. McKenzie Bowell, as Chief Commissioner, to advise with him in the matter.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

In his speech last Friday at Niagara Falls, Ont., Mr. Haggard Minister of Railways, declared that the Dominion general election will take place within the year. This means that the Government will go to the country by December, 1892. A good many have the impression that it will take place some months earlier.

Col. Kenna M P P. has been confirmed as representative in the Local Legislature for this county. A notice for the withdrawal of the election petition in this case has been sent to the Registrar of the Court of Appeal. The result of this constituency will be well pleased at this result. We have had enough of election protest for the present century.

The Toronto Public School Board have under discussion the following resolution:

That this Board memorializes the Minister of Education for the purpose of securing such legislation as shall constitute measures for saving, increasing and maintaining the educational Public School course, in every township, village, town or city, in which a majority of the ratepayers are prepared to make the necessary provision for its introduction.

The Mutual Returns says that the race for the Wardenship of Halton is likely to be between W. G. Pettit, reeve of Nelson, and Dr. Webster, reeve of Acton. The contest is likely to be a close one. It is not probable that either will be successful. If this constituency will be well pleased at this result. Whether nor Mr. Pettit carry an assurance that they will be elected for 1892.

Importers to New York were told of the opinion that the consumers in America may suffer next season from China's discontinuance in the present war, there being a possibility that the Chinese may impose a heavy duty on tea. Such a move would of course cause an advance in the price of the Chinese product, but this would as surely be to the advantage of exporters in India and other countries.

In his annual message to Congress last week President Cleveland advocated, in the section devoted to the tariff, free coal and free iron and intimated that as the very substantial protection afforded the sugar industry from languishing to the extent of closing down the manufacture, throwing their employees out of work, they had better be dropped for good. He strongly advocates the taking of the duty.

The statement of revenue and expense for November appears in the last issue of the *Canada Gazette*. The revenue is \$10,632 less than same month last year, but the expenditure shows the large decrease of \$60,779, and the net result for the month is a better balance of \$50,146 million dollars over November of last year. The figures are: Revenue, \$2,775,56; expenditure, \$2,665,512. For the first month of the fiscal year the total revenue has been \$13,665,634; expenditure, \$12,430,439, showing a surplus of ordinary revenue over the expenditure of \$1,235,000. For the same period last year the receipts were \$15,900,627, and the expenditure \$11,636,211 showing a surplus of \$4,963,406.

Incidentally, we are illustrating in some respects at least of what a modern town must be like. The most striking point, it is only in the very poorest sections that there are two houses on such lots, and even then the buildings are 10 to 20 feet back from the sidewalk, and on streets 100 feet wide. There are only five blocks of compacted tenements in the whole city of 90,000 inhabitants, and these are in the best streets and bring the highest rentals paid. What London is to day almost every city on the spreading surface of the earth has become fully effective. The day of narrow lanes and huddled tenements will soon be over. The day of the broad bat and garden about each house, even the poorest, is rapidly coming.

An article appears in a recent issue of *Henderson's* on the experience of Canada during the past in the United States last year. The Newark and New Brunswick railroads had suffered heavy losses, failing to recover. In the first place, Canals had no power, because she had no cause of power. She had no Sherman silver law in operation, pouring millions of Treasury notes into the circulation whether they were wanted or not. The banks, and not the Government, supplied the currency of the country as it was wanted, and rendered what it was not wanted. The results of the two different systems stand in glaring contrast to each other.

The deposits in the banks of the United States in 1890, 1891, and those of May, September, 1891, totalled those of May, fell off only three per cent. The loans and discounts on one side of the bank fell off 12 per cent, while on the other side the shrinkage was only 11 per cent. In fact, the only trouble in Canada was due to the proximity to U.S. It was a sort of induction from the great disturbance in the neighbor land, but Canada fortunately had the means for minimizing even this. Her bank system was so arranged that the demand for more currency could be met on the very day and hour when it came.
