TORONTO'S THIRD-FIRE.

Toronto, March 17. Toronto was visited by a terrible fire on Monday morning which destroyed the Simpson's Fine New Building and the other three corners of Yonge and Queen Streets.

At the south-east corner of Yonge and Queen streets, the Simpson's Fine New Building, which was a six-story building, was completely destroyed.
