The *Mail and Empire* says the bricker lion of Canadian trade and the enhanced prices of most Canadian staples are not due to anything of the nature of a boom. They are the result of a general revival, of which Canada is in an excellent position to reap the full benefit. The caution displayed by the leading bankers will tend to prevent the revival in business, developing into a boom.

The Inter-State Commerce Commission has notified railroads that certain provisions of the Act of March 2, 1913, will take effect on July 1, namely, the requirement that all freight cars shall be equipped with hand-holds or grab-irons in the ends and sides of each car, and the establishment of a standard height of draw-bars. Severe penalties attend the use of cars not conforming to the law in these particulars.

It is quite clear that Manitoba means to defend her school laws from attack and interference, and it now remains to be seen whether Quebec can force the Dominion into further blunder. The Manitoba Order was a grave mistake, and it is better to acknowledge that fact now than after futile attempts at coercion.—*Hamilton Spectator*.
