NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The Arbitration Regarding Disputed Dominion and Provincial Accounts.
The return issued by the British Board of Trade for June shows that the imports increased £50,000 and the exports £110,000 as compared with those for June last year.

A Statement has been made that the deal between the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Company and the C.P.R. will be consummated during next week, by which the C.P.R. will operate the line between Toronto and Hamilton, and have connections with the Vanderbilt system for the remaining portion of the road.

It is said that large quantities of American silver are being sent to Canada at the border towns, and thence into general circulation. American silver at the border only worth 50 cents on the dollar. Yet it passes untraced, and is taken by merchants and sold generally. It will not pass in England, nor on the continent of Europe, save at large amounts, and our Canadian silver will not be received at par with our American neighbors.

The British Hay Trade Journal, with reports from all prominent hay producers in Canada, says that all States east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio will not produce 50 per cent. of an average crop. In the provinces of Quebec and Eastern Ontario indications are that the crop will be a short yield, and that country hay buyers in Canada now, and will divert the supply which would normally go to the United States to that country.

The Illinois League of Ladies, Inc. has issued a manifesto declaring that the depression in trade is due to the fall in prices. It says it is also noticeable that the transference of productive industry from gold to silver standard countries is meaning many of the chief manufacturers here, yet Great Britain alone blocks the way to any international attempt to re-monetize silver. The manifesto asks the dealers to give monetary reform the foremost place when they are deciding how to vote.

Canada gets a large share of the benefits from Britain's naval strength, with the peace and protection which that strength insures to our commerce. Canada gets the benefit of the diplomatic services of Britain. Canada has used British consuls in every corner of the globe. Canadians have the respect and guarantee which British consular officers everywhere ensure to return for all that. It may be almost enough to let the Government's ordinary share. We don't pay anything else.

The Otterville News is conducting a drive of waters for Otterville for a protection, to cost \$1500, and says that some of the taxpayers of that town oppose it on account of the expense. Milton and Deseronto both revealed an enterprise within the last few years, and spent a great deal more than \$1500 each in getting them. They now have abundance of the best of water, not only for fire protection, but for general purposes, and it is doubtful whether a single taxpayer can be found in either town who will say that the money was badly invested.—Milton Chronicle.

Since the United States prohibited and rejected immigration, the British American Republics have been the ground for the refuse of Europe. These countries retaining the situation, are now following Uncle Sam's example, and are seeking to shut out all who cannot show that they are one of their own country and without assistance of individuals or firms. It is noticeable that since the strict enforcement of the law in the United States, a better class of immigrants have arrived, and nearly all of them are with sufficient means to purchase homes, which is the best class of settlers for any country.

NO REMEDIAL BILL NOW.

This Announcement is Accompanied with the Resignation of the Quebec Ministers.
A CRISIS AT THE CAPITAL.

OTTAWA, July 10. Mr. Foster made the long expected announcement of the Government's policy in regard to the remedial order in the House on Monday afternoon. Matters looked serious before this statement but they have since advanced the form of a crisis. It is reported that in consequence of the Government's postponement of legislation in a special session to be called in January, Messrs. Ouellet, Angere and Sir Adolphe Caron have resigned. There is excitement in all quarters and the position is felt to be a critical one.

The following is the statement made by Hon. Mr. Foster in the House on Monday: It is my duty to advise you that the Government has had under its consideration the remedial order of the Manitoba Legislature to the remedial order of the 21st March, 1905, and, after careful deliberation, has arrived at the following conclusion: Though there may be sufficient ground to be satisfied that the remedial order in question, the Government believes that it may be interpreted to holding out some hope of an amicable settlement of the question on the basis of possible action by the Manitoba Government and Legislature, and the Dominion Government is most unwilling to take any action which can be interpreted as formalizing such a settlement. The Government has also discovered the difficulties to be met with in preparing and perfecting legislation on an important subject as the present one. A communication will be sent immediately to the Manitoba Government on the subject, with a view to ascertaining whether the Government is disposed to make a settlement of the question which will be reasonably satisfactory to the minority of that Province, without making it necessary to call into requisition the powers of the Dominion Parliament. A session of the present Parliament will be called together, to meet not later than the first Thursday of January next. If by that time the Manitoba Government fails to make a satisfactory arrangement to remedy the grievances of the minority, the Dominion Government will be prepared at the next session of Parliament, to be called as above stated, to introduce and press to a conclusion such legislation as will afford an adequate measure of relief to the minority of that Province, in accordance with the judgment of the Privy Council and the remedial order of the 21st March, 1905.

The announcement of the policy of the Government on the Manitoba action, the resignation and the resignation of the three Ministers from Quebec, Sir Adolphe Caron, Mr. Ouellet and Mr. Angere, charged the air heavily with political excitement. It developed on Monday that the Government, as announced from Quebec, and in the afternoon the three French Ministers also talked over the situation with Lord Aberdeen. It is without doubt the desire of His Excellency to endeavor to bring about an amicable settlement of the matter, but so far his efforts have not been successful.

When the House adjourned last night it was learned that the crisis was over. Mr. Foster's statement had been received and it was said that the Government had decided to accept the remedial order. The House adjourned on Monday. The Government's policy is now accepted, and it is expected that the remedial order will be introduced before prorogation. This the Quebec ministers refuse to accept, and insist that the bill shall not only be introduced, but passed this session.
