The Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, of accounts as follows Secretary of State for the Colonies, has written a letter to one of his supporters, in which he says that he accepted his present post : (1) to see what can be done to bring the autonomous colonies and the Mother Country closer, and (2) to try to develop the resources of the Crown colonies, especially to increase the trade between them and Great Britain. All his efforts, he adds, will be devoted to these sude.

The recent wholesale superannuation in the Customs Department of the Civil Service have given rise to no end of criticism at the department. However, it is stated that all have been made in the interests of conomy. Thirty officers were superannuated on the 12th of July. Besides the three men superannuated in Toronto, four in Hamilton, three in St. John, five in Halifax and two in Windsor, many superannuations have taken place in the smaller offices.

It is stated in Ottawa that an additional mail subsidy of \$100,000- per annum has been granted the Canadian Pacific Railway Company by order in Council. The Globe says: It was intended that this amount should have been placed in the supplementary estimates last session, but as that would hardly be consistent with Mr. Foster's pledges of economy it was allowed to stand over until parliament prorogued. It will of course be necessary to bring it down next session as a supplementary vote.

Referring to the resignation of Major J. B. PRAUSON, Esq. General Herbert just accepted by the Government, the Mail and Empire says the departing major general was a thorough soldier, and when this is said no higher compliment need be paid to him as a pro fessional man.
