Capada's exports for the past month show a decrease of one million and a half, but the increase for the quarter reaches the total of \$818,259. The imports during September increased half a million although for the quarter there is a decrease of \$512,680. The revenue collected from Customs incressed \$200,000 during the month, and for the quarter it shows an increase of \$335,007.

It does not appear that the Canadian live stock trade is likely to find a serious competitor in Australia. On the latest live stock shipment from the antifodes to England there was a loss of \$20,000. which is attributed to four causes: - The unsuitable nature of the stock, excessive treight and insurance, conditions of transit and mortality at sea. Ten per cent. of the cattle died, and 16 per cent. of the sheep

According to official advices received day the total scaling catch for the Canadian fleet this sesson amounts to 172,500. against 94,474, last year.
