THE BUDGET SPEECH. The Estimates Reduced By \$170;-

242 for the Current Year. OSTAWA, Peb. S .- Priday afternoon the Hon. George E. Foster delivered his annual budget speech to the House of Commons. It was one of the great field days of the session, the occasion when the Government takes the House and the country into its confilence and renders an account of its stewardship.

The books are opened, and the revenu is explained and the expenditure justified The practice of a budget is almost as old as parliamentary government ifself, and of late years it has been adopted even in countries where responsible legislative bodies do not exist.

The estimates for the fiscal, year 1896. were laid on the table early last week. total amount to be voted and authorized by statute is \$11,230,681, a decrease of \$170 242 from the amount last year. The prin cipal increases are: Public debt (Sinking Pund) \$250,943; Soperanuation \$37,000 Militia \$372,716; Railways and Canale \$85,540; Public Works \$217,270; Geological Survey \$22,000; Indiana \$80,263 North West Mounted Polloe \$30,000; Col-
