The speech from the throne, which was read at the opening of the Imperial Parlia ment Tuesday made no reference whatever to the subject of arbitration of the Venezuela dispute. The Monroe doctrine was entirely ignored.

The leading newspapers of London, Eng. reproduced the speeches made in the Domin ion Parliament on Wednesday in suppor of Mr. Neill's resolution attesting Canada's loyalty to England and pay tribute to the patriotism and dignity displayed by the

Mr Smith, in the United States Benate on Monday said that he was opposed any further action at present in connection with Venezuela. The Monroe doctrine had been proclaimed with no uncertain sound a commission had been appointed, and that, he thought, was as far as Congress should go at present.

In the Dominion House of Commons Monday Mr. Flint's prohibitory moti was reached, but the mover was not ready to proceed with it. An agreement was reached between the leaders to the effect that hereafter when motions are reached and not proceeded with they shall be dropped from the order paper.

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT.

Session Opened on Tuesday -- Out line of Speech From the Throne. Tonoxto, Feb. 12. -His Honor Lieut Governor Kirkpatrick opened the second session of the eighth Parliament of the

Ontario Legislature yesterday. In the Speech from the Throne, two matters of imperial concern are referred to the lamented death of Prince Henry of Battenberg, and the controversy between the representatives of Great Britain, and the United States over Venezuela. In regard to the latter question the general feeling of Canadiane, it is stated, is that our interests are inseparable from those of Great Britain, and that friendly relations with the United States are earnestly to be

Allusion is made to the fact that though the prices of farm produce are low, farmers are doing all in their power to meet adverse conditions by the study of new methods. The agricultural associations, aided by the Legislature, are flourishing, the ploneer farm in Western Algoms, promises to be a success. The igmber industry continues . depressed, but there is activity in mining

Among the measures that are to be submitted are bills reducing the number of members of County Councils, revising and con-olidating the educational laws of th Province, increasing the usefulness of the County Courts, improving the agriculture and arts act, and extending the provisions of the mechanics' lien laws. Preparations will be made for decennial revision and consolidation of the statutes. Two questions relating to the liquor traffic are now before the courts. The Privy Council bas not yet given its decision in regard to Provincial prohibition. In another tost case judgement has been given in favor of the right of the Province to impose license fees upon brewers and distillers and the latter have appealed to the Privy Conneil.
