TUPPER FOR PREMIER Sir Mackenzie Bowell Resigned on Monday -- A Forecast of the

New Cabinet.

GENERAL ELECTION -- 23rd JUNE OTLANA, April 29. - Parliament prorogue on Thursday and the papital is now protty well deserted as far as members of Parlis ment and Senators are concerned. The second act of importance of the week was the resignation of the premierahip on Mon-

day, by Sir Mackenzie Bowell. Sir Mackenzie Bowell ceased to Premier of Canada at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon. In accordance with his deter mination to retire from politics, of .whic he has made no secret to his friends, Sir Mackenzie went to Rideau Hall at 1 o'clock this afternoon, having previously arranged to meet His Excellency there The inter view which took place lasted for nearly two hours, when the chief advisor of the Crown laid before Lord Aberdeen his reasons for desiring to be relieved of the responsibility of his office What these reasons are is a matter for conjecture, but they were deemed by Lord Aberdoen of sufficient weight to warrant him in accepting the resignation

with which they were accompanied. It was about 5.30 p. m. when Sir Charles Tupper left for Rideau Hall, being sent for by His Excellency the Gevernor-General Sir Charles was asked to form an Admin istration and has consented to do so. The following is given by the Mail and

NOTICE is hereby given that all residents of Acton are required forthwith to clean their cellars, drains, yards, pig styes, water closets, and other outbuildings and premises, and remove therefrom all dirt, filth, manure, or other betance which may endanger the l'ubile Health, and to have the same completed at latest by the 10th day of May next, on which day the Sanitary Inspector will commence a general inspection. And further take notice that the section of the Public Health Act prohibiting the keeping of hogs, between the 15th May and the 1st of November, except in pens at least 70 feet from any dwelling house and 50 feet from any street or lane, with the floors kept free from standing water and regularly cleaned, will be strictly enforced.
