## NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The Emperor of Germany has given great offence to the clerical party by declaring that clergymen have no right to interfere in politics.

It is reported that in thirty-four constituencies the Conservative candidates have pledged themselves to vote against Imperial Legislation if anyone ventures to introduce it again.

The Hague Act of 1893 is amended in various respects. The office is to close for registration of instruments at 1 p.m. on Saturdays during long vacation. Municipalities are to receive a larger proportion than before of the excess of tax beyond those now stipulated.

Newfoundland advises that the fisheries are still not an unusually large fleet of fishing vessels for the Newfoundland Banks and Trinity Coast, and it is expected that 1896 will reveal a keener competition from that quarter than has been seen since 1890.

At Sir Charles Tupper's big dinner at Montreal last week Hon. Mr. Tupper said that the Newfoundland Bill would be reintroduced and carried through Parliament if it took from fall to spring to do so, a statement that was cheered in the most enthusiastic manner.

Those fellows who six years ago were "just waiting to see if the world would be sustained" before investing hundreds of millions in this country's industries are back again. Queen, how they always bob up before elections and are never heard of afterwards! — Hamilton Times.

The split between the Irish party and the federal over the Education bill which gave the Government such a large majority, has resulted in the Welsh Nationalists deciding that they will not support the Irish in their demand for Home Rule as they are evidently under the control of the priests.

The law has been announced concerning burials so that a certificate must be obtained from the Municipal Clerk in which the death occurs by the friends of the deceased for presentation to the caretaker of the cemetery before interment. A caretaker is liable to a heavy fine if he buries a body without one.

A Halifax paper announces that the scheme of coast defence which is being prepared for submission to the Canadian Government estimates that three fast cruisers, with quick firing guns, would be necessary on the Atlantic to cover the Gulf of St. Lawrence and coast waters of Nova Scotia and the Bay of Fundy.

A provision of the amended Municipal Act states that no council can have any accounts, make any contracts, or appoint or dismiss anyone from office after December 31st of the year for which they were elected, and the newly elected council is to take office on the second Monday, instead of the third Monday in January.

John D. Detwiler some time ago put a sum on a house for Robert Falle, a farmer near Guelph, to help him pay for the maintenance of the house. The Guelph Street made an order suspending that sum, and on Monday the Divisional Court upheld his order dismissing an appeal by Falle, on the ground that "an agreement or contract is not an essential foundation to a valid ten." So the law holds good. This is an important and interesting decision for mechanics.

In order to be able to give the readers of the *Champion* definite information as to the prospects of there being a third party candidate in the field in the coming election in Halton a representative of this paper interviewed George Hume this morning. Mr. Hume gave the *Champion* authority to announce that he had decided on allowing himself to be nominated as a McCarthy candidate, and that his address to the electors would be published next week. In Henry Clews' banking circular of May 10, reference is made to overproduction of manufactured goods in the States, "especially where modern improvements have greatly stimulated output." Small stocks are carried by retailers and jobbers, who refuse to be caught with large supplies in a falling market. The results, says Mr. Clews, are the manufactured goods are frequently accumulating at first hand, necessitating combinations of various sorts to sustain values and regulate production.

China is just now giving the world some striking proofs of her financial stability. The payment of \$60,000,000 of her war indemnity to Japan and the prompt settlement of claims for damages suffered by American citizens in the vicious outbreaks a few months ago show that the resources of the Chinese people are fully equal to the heavy burden which an unnatural conflict has imposed upon them. In so far as it helps the great industrial development which is sure to follow the return of peace, China may yet come to appreciate her costly struggle with Japan, as a veritable blessing in disguise.
