the midnight train. Councils and Boards of  
Trade at Stratford, Berlin and Guelph  
are taking active steps from the  
railway authorities the restoration of the  
train. At the meeting of Guelph City  
Council on Monday evening the following  
resolution was passed: "Resolved that  
the chairman of the Board of Trade communicate  
with the General Manager of the G. T. R., Montreal, urging the necessity  
of increased railway accommodation be-  
tween Toronto and Guelph, and requesting  
that a train leave Toronto not earlier than  
10:30 p.m. each evening except Sundays."
