NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The business outlook throughout the country is very encouraging. Bradstreet's latest letter on the business situation is the most reassuring report issued for months.

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company have under consideration the connection of the various sections of the road by telephone. The adoption of this plan was deemed practicable during the recent strike and it is believed would be perfectly feasible. If the plan is approved, connection will first be made between Montreal and Detroit, Sherbrooke and Chalk River.

The Government has decided not to make any promotion of the Civil Service until after the revision of the Civil Service Act, which it contemplates taking Parliament next session. It also proposed not to make any representation to the Senate, which are generally required until the legislation on the subject is remodelled along lines which harmonize with the views of the Administration.

The price of cheese is encouraging to dairymen. In Montreal it is at present about one cent per pound higher than it was last year at this date. This represents about 10 per cent increase. At the end of October, 1895, Quebec cheese sold for 10¢; this year it is 10¢ to 10½ cents. Quebec cheese last year sold at 9½¢ to 9½¢, for this year Ontario brings 10½¢ to 10½¢ a pound.

Residential returns from United States show that the railroads have swept the country, carrying all the doubtful states, the border states, Maryland, the two Virginias, and many others. The eastern States have gone solidly Republican by increased majorities. The people of the United States will have reason for unusually devout thanksgiving at this result when the national Thanksgiving Day arrives on the 16th inst.

The trade and navigation statistics for 1895-96 show that Canada's aggregate foreign trade reached \$132,024,862, an increase of nearly \$15,000,000 over last year, but a decline of \$2,000,000 and over, below 1894 and two preceding years. The exports, \$121,013,852, are the largest in the history of confederation, of which \$16,915,337 were the produce of Canada. The imports entered for consumption were \$11,000,000, of which \$6,290,750 were dutiable, the average percentage being 30.8. The aggregate of free goods imported was lower than in preceding years.

The chief game warden of the province is sending out deer licenses for sale to the township clerks the organized districts throughout the localities where deer are found in the province. The Commissioner of Game, Mr. Gilman, under whom the game laws were originally enacted, recently appointed a number of men to sell these licenses, but the number has proved to be inadequate, and many letters of enquiry have been received at the buildings. It has therefore been thought well, for the sake of convenience, to make the license available through the township clerks.

MCKINLEY FOR PRESIDENT.
The Republicans Win the United States by an Overwhelming Majority.

THE SILVER PARTY DISMISSED.

New-York, Nov. 1.—One of the most extraordinary election contests in the history of the country terminated last night in the utter routing of the free silver advocates.

The wrecking of the Democratic party and the triumph of the party of protection and of the Republicans was almost as advocated by the Republican leaders. It was estimated that 350 Republican Congressmen are safely elected, and perhaps an even greater number, and a sufficient number of the new Legislature will be Republican to give that party control of the United States Senate.

The total number of electoral votes is 447; necessary for a choice 221. So far, as definitely heard from Mr. McKinley has secured 221 and Bryan 165, leaving 14 to be decided in McKinley's favor, so far as the count is 14 to 16.

The figures in the popular vote will not be known for some days. They embrace about 14,000,000 votes. Of the total number Mr. McKinley's share of the popular vote will be approximately 9,000,000.

Mr. Bryan has received the most decisive defeat of any Presidential candidate since Horace Greeley contested the office with General Grant in 1872. General Grant, who was seeking a second term, received 269 votes in the Electoral College, against 104 for his opponent, the losing candidate receiving less than 25 per cent of the College representation. Mr. Bryan has probably obtained about 31 per cent of the Electoral College.

The election of Major McKinley by a decisive majority shows that in spite of disquieting signs in oratory and without a sound political judgment possessed the great majority of the people. The third major cause has won victory.
