interment took place. The County Guol. According to the last report of the spector of Prisons there were 312. com mittments to Halton County gaol last year. Of these but four were women. the number 251 were discharged without trial,: they were presumably tramps and vagrants: 39 were sentenced for a definite period. Of the 312 committed, 285 were returned as intemperate. The average cost per prisoner to the county for food clothing, etc., was 75 cents, and the total expense per prisoner was \$4.00. The

average cost per day for each prisoner was .52 cents; while the average cost throughout the province was 20.28 cents. Guelph gaol cost the highest rate in Ontario-45.60 cents per day for each prisoner. The Spring Assizes.

The Spring Assizes were beld at Milton on Monday, Chief Justice Sir Wm. R. Meredith presiding. The docket was very light, there being only one criminal and one civil case for the court. Staley and . Toby from Oakville were charged that on the night of the 19th December last they stole from the warehouse of Mr. Foulds in Oakville a quantity of shorts: The evideuce was somewhat contradictory and largely oircumstantial, and the jury brought in a verdict of acquittal. S. F. Washington for the Crown, D. .O. Cameron for the prisoners. Cross v. Davidson is an action for damages brought by Albert E. Cross, bailiff of the second Division Court of the County of Halton, against Joseph Davidson, of Toronto, for wrongfully taking out of his possession goods which he had under seizure by virtue of excontions in his hand issued from the Division Court. Decision was reserved.
