FACTS ABOUT A WATCH. Open your watch and look at the little whoele, springs and scrows, each an indicpeneable part of the whole wonderful machine. Notice the busy little balance wheel as it flies to and fro unceasingly, day and recoast in smaller fire-bells. and night, year in and year out.

This wonderful little machine is the

result of hundreds of years of study and in Philadelphia. It was imported from one-thousandths of an inch wide. It takes 308 000 of these screws to weigh a pound. and s. pound is worth \$1585. The hairspring is a strip of the finest steel, about nine and one-half inches long, one onebundredth of an inch, wide and twenty seven ten thousandtha of an inch thick. is coiled up in spiral form and finely tempered. The process of tempering these springs was long held as a secret by the few fortunate ones possessing it and even now is not generally known. Their manufacture requires great skill and care. The strip is guaged to twenty one-thousandths bring him to the girl's side and make life of an inch, but no measuring instrument has yet been devised capable of fine enough

> ence in the running of a watch of about six . The value of these springs when finished and placed in watches is enormous in pro portion to the material from which they are made. A comparison will give a good idea: A ton of steel made up into hair springs, when in watches, is worth more than twelve and one-half times the value of the same weight in pure gold. Hairspring wire weighs one twentieth of a grain

than half a pound. The balance gives five vibrations every second, 300 every minute, 18,000 every hour, 432,000 every day, 157,680,000 every year. At each vibration it rotates about one and one fourth times, which makes 197,100,000 revolutions every year. In order that we may better understand the stupendous amount of labor performed by these works let us make a few compari-BOUB : Take for illustration a locomotive with six foot driving wheels. Let its wheels be run until they have given the same number of revolutions that a watch does in one year and they will have cover od a distance equal to twenty-eight com olete circuits of the earth.
