France is getting back at the United states in retaliation for its hostile tariff even if in doing so it makes it harder for its own people. It has increased by about 50 to 60 per cent, the rates of duties levied on pork and other meat products, imported chiefly from the United States.

Egypt at present, according to latest census, posesses the largest population its history. It has also the most lightly taxed population; certainly since the Turks etablished their rule .- Whatever outsiders may desire the Egyptian people should not want a restoration of unrestricted Khedival rule. The improvement is British i its entirety.

The work of organizing the campaign against departmental stores is progressin rapidly in Toronto. A lot of statistical information, showing the offeet of such stores, has already been collected and is being given to the public. Saturday Night is leading in the campaign with effective work, and the Retail Merchante' Association is perfecting organization.

The Dominion Government has decided to reduce the rate of interest allowed or savings bank deposits from 34 to 3 per cent. This will reduce the interest paid on deposite aggregating \$49,500,000 from \$1,-732,500 to \$1,485,000 reducing the yearly payment to depositors by \$247,500. The reason for this reduction is the general decrease in the earning power of money.

The Montreal Transportantion Company is credited with having engaged a large quantity of American grain for shipment, aud also to have made engagements for wheat from Fort William to Montreal, the quoted rates being six to six and a half cents. One shipper estimates that fully ten million bushels of grain will go by the St. Lawrence route during May, June and

The G. T. R. and C. P. R. have issued two new tariffs, which went into effect on April 15, and make reductions of 5c, per "100 pounds on many specified commodities, such as bage, twine, iron and steel articles. The tariff applies to Montreal, Kingston, Toronto, Hamilton, Winnipeg, Portage, and Brandon. Reductions are also made on westbound freight to Kootenay and Pacific coast points.

The Optario License Department is busy figuring on the many amendments respecting the application of the new License Act, with a view to instructing magistrates as to its enforcement: One -amendment which has not been made public is that providing that the law shall not come into operation until July 1st, instead of May 1st, as was at first intended. Druggiste have that length of time to get rid of surplus stock. The cancellation of licenses under the new act will take place on May let.

The railway pass question has been settled in Ontario. In 1896 two Ontario Cabinet Ministers went to Montreal arrange with the railways for some other means of transit than the usual passes which gave so much offence to the Patrons. Their mission, however, was futile. This. year a special committee was unofficially appointed to look into the matter. The rosult is that an arrangement has been reached by which the railways receive the mileage, allowance of the members in exchange for passes.

Alien Labor Legislation has entered now phase. The principle of retaliation has been endorsed in a speech by the Premier, who, while regretting the course the Government had to adopt, -one forced on them by the persistent ill-treatment of Canadians by the American authorities,thought that Parliament should enact : measure provision for provision with the law of the United States. The subject bas been referred to a special committee with authority to take evidence and to prepare a measure to meet the requirements of the

A bill for the amendment of the Ontario Marriage Act has been passed by the Legislature. Several important changes were made which will be gladly welcomed both by issuers of marriago licenses and by persons: contemplating matrimouy. By the act of 1846, both of the parties to the intended marriage were obliged to make affidavit, one of which affidavits at least must be made before the issuer. The new bill provides that before the issue of the liceuse the affidavit, before required to be made by both parties, shall only be necessary on the part of one of them.

The General Provincial elections took place in Nova Scoris- on Tuesday and a contest in Colohester County for th Dominion Commons. The result of th Provincial contests was an overwhelming victory for the Liberale. The Conservatives number not more than four men, and porhaps only three, to the Assembly, which consists of 38 members. Every member of the Provincial Government who offered for re-election was returned. For the first time in geven years Hulifux elected a full Diberal ticket. The Dominion election is olaimed by the Conservatives, and returns, which are reported complete, give Mr. Muir a majority of two yotes over McClure. The Liberals, however, claim a majority for McClure.


