Fielding's statement embodying the changes contemplated in the tariff resolutions as originally submitted was regarded with much interest. We are in Redlands, in Southern California. It is about 70 miles east from Los Angeles and is 1500 feet elevation, surrounded on three sides by mountains ranging from 2000 to 12000 fee high. As we are sitting in our tent we can see their snow-capped peaks. The water from these, as the snow melts, runs into large dam with which they irrigate through the summer, as they have no rain. The valley is filled with orange, lemon and apricot groves, with a considerable amount of olives and prupes. They have large packing houses for oranges and lemons and are building a large cannery this year. Redlands has about 6000 population but it

takes in about 17,000 acres of land. The real business part of the town is no larger than that of Acton. Outside of that each house has its lot of 24 to 10 acres of fruit trees, so that the city improvements have to stretch out a long distance. It is a prohibition town and Sunday is almost as well observed as it is in Canada: There are about 15 churches, representing, I think, all of the different denominations. But I must stop to be in time for the mail. I will probably write again when I have seen more of the ways and manners of the people.
