In the Senate on Tuesday Sir Oliver Mowat moved that a loyal and patriotic address of congratulation from the Parliament of Canada to Her Majesty the Queen on the occasion of the 60th anniversary of her ascension to the throne, be adopted.

The bicycle will soon have a formidable rival in the horseless carriage which Edison declares will shortly be sold in a perfected form for \$100 at most. There is a demand for the horseless carriage and it seems reasonably cortain that the demand will be supplied before many years.

When Queen Victoria came to the throne sixty years ago, the population of Canada was only a fifth of what it is now, and its total revenue was only \$300,000, whereas now it is about \$36,000,000. In 1837 there were about 14 miles of railway; now there are 15,000 miles in actual operation.

The estimates of the temporary increases of the population of London towards the close of June continue to rise, and now five millions is mentioned as a possible figure. If that were so it would mean that a population of 10,000,000 would be gathered together for a few days within the radius of what is known as Greater London, larger number by millions than ever was gathered within a similar area in the world's history.

The suggestion made by the London committee, of which Lord Cranborne, M. P., and the Marquis of Dufferin are leading members, that bonfires be lighted through out the British dependencies on the night of June 22od as the closing event of the diamond jubilee celebration of that day, has been taken up in Canada, by the Sons of Scotland Association, the officers of which have made arrangements for bonfires from Halifax to Vancouver.

Premier Laurier will be accompanied on his tour to the Queen's Jubilee at London by Madame Laurier, his scoretary, Mr. Boudreault, Captain H. A. Bate, Miss Bate and Mrs Edwards. He will probably remain in London till about the middle of July, after which he will travel in France and Belgium, and perhaps in Spain and Italy, returning to Canada about the end of August or the early part of September.
