Sir Richard Cartwright is the great man of the hour at present. He holds the position of Minister of Trade and Commerce, acting Minister of Militia, acting President of the Council and acting Premier.

The number of post offices in the Dominion increased from 7,205 in 1886 to 9,100 in 1895; the number of letters in the same period increased from 71 millions to nearly 116 millions; and the revenue from \$2,469,747 to \$4,000,000.

The Governor-General has received a letter of thanks from the viceroy of India, in which it is stated that Canada stood next to Great Britain in her contributions to the India fund.

It has been customary for some years past for Queen's honours to be distributed in various parts of the empire on the 24th of May. This year, it was decided some time ago to distribute Queen's birthday honours in connection with Her Majesty's Jubilee this month.

The arrangement with the C. P. R. concerning the Crow's Nest Pass railway line was announced at the Liberal caucus at Ottawa. The bonus is \$11,000 a mile, and the C. P. R. makes large reductions in freight rates, and gives several other important concessions in return.

Under the new tariff articles by mail or express at not more than 50 cents are now exempted from duty. The overhauling of the mails by custom officials and the holding of such small articles for duty was a very intricate business, the duties being too small to be worth calculating.

It is now stated that with the starting of Sunday cars in Toronto, the Niagara Navigation Co. will inaugurate a Sunday boat service between that city and Lewiston. This existing law prohibiting boats running on Sunday between two points in Canada, it permits their running between a Canadian and foreign port.

Mrs. Dal Val is now in the Northwest. It is said an understanding has been reached between Mr. McRae and the Dominion and Provincial governments regarding the future attitude of the Catholic ecclesiastical authorities towards the Manitoba school law, and that all hostility to the law on the part of the Catholics, will soon cease.

Sir William Whitby, the Premier and Attorney-General of Newfoundland, will be the speaker at the Dominion Jubilee at that place on Sunday. It is understood that while in London he will open negotiations for the settlement of the French shore questions, as a preliminary to arranging for the federation of Newfoundland with the Dominion.

A leading London paper had this item a few days ago: "We are requested to contradict the rumor that the Duke of Leeds will succeed the Earl of Aberdeen as Governor-General of Canada. This will be welcome news to many Canadians who could not relish the idea of a hibernian manufacturer like the Duke of Leeds being placed over the Canada of ours."

It has been announced in Parliament that the civil service superannuation bill and the franchise bill, to which allusion was made in the Governor's speech at the opening of the session, will be dropped. It is understood this determination was reached by the Government in order to allow the Premier to leave for England to attend the Queen's Jubilee celebrations.

The Michigan Central has put on a train from Chicago to New York, composed of a buffet, library car, stock with books and periodicals, a barber shop and bath-room, smoking-room and baggage compartment. A handsome state-room car, two double state-room cars, a standard dining car and a day coach with everything about it brand new, completed the equipment. This is claimed to be the best railway service as any in the world.

In the debate on the tariff last Thursday Mr. Henderson moved that item 16, fresh mutton and lamb, be set aside, he struck out, so the duty on these products would then be 3 cents per pound. The effect of this amendment, if adopted, would have been to place mutton on the unenumerated list at three cents a pound. Several hours of discussion, involving the general subject of agricultural protection, followed, the end being the defeat of the amendment.

It is now stated that arrangements between the Dominion Government and the G. T. R. with reference to running special refrigerator cars, are about completed. The scheme embraces a system of cold storage accommodation for the shipment of produce from Canada to Great Britain. Cars with refrigerator accommodation will run from Montreal, Goderich, Barrie, Wainwright and Point Edward late Toronto, where the contents will be made up into car lots and sent through by fast through train to Montreal, Toronto thus becoming the central point for Western Ontario.

The half-yearly meeting of the General Executive of the Provincial Sabbath School Association was held in Toronto. The reports showed progressive work in every department and the finances are 8000 better than a year ago, but still show a deficit of 8000. However, there are 13,000 in pledges still unmet. The programme for the annual convention at Hamilton on the 27th, 28th and 29th of October was partly outlined and promises to be an excellent one. It was decided to send the General Secretary and an assistant into the newly opened territory of Ontario, as far west as Rat Portage, for S. S. missionary work during the months of July and August.

It is reported the Philadelphia & Reading railway is seeking an entrance into Toronto. Mr. E. S. Large, of Toronto, will leave for Japan at the end of the present month as an independent missionary. Mrs. Large was formerly in Japan under Methodist auspices. Mr. J. H. R. Milson's will was probated at Montreal, and dispensed of an estate of about \$2,000,000, divided among relatives and friends, also a number of bequests to public institutions, including \$100,000 to McGill University.

BOY VOYAGE TO ENGLAND.

Premier Laurier Given a Hearty Welcome at the Queen's Jubilee. ADDRESS TO THE QUEEN.

OTTAWA, June 9.—Amidst the cheers and hurrahs of a large and representative gathering at the Central depot last Thursday morning the Montreal train steamed out, bearing the Premier and Madame Laurier and party, bound for England to attend the Diamond Jubilee festivities.

As the train pulled out from the station the Premier and Mme. Laurier bowed their acknowledgments for the enthusiastic send-off by the many present.

The House of Commons last Thursday gave fitting and sincere expression to the loyal sentiment which pervades it as a body and which fills the breast of its every member, by unanimously and enthusiastically acquiescing in the address of congratulation to Queen Victoria upon the completion of the 60th anniversary of her auspicious reign, which had already been passed by the Senate, Prime Minister Laurier, in moving congratulatory in the address, briefly summed up the events and achievements in all departments of human activity in the last three score years, and pronounced an eloquent panegyric upon Her Majesty, emphasizing her virtues, both as a ruler and a woman.

Mr. Laurier has started on his trip for the jubilee festivities and Canadians generally will wish him bon voyage. He goes not as the leader of a party, but as the accredited representative of the Dominion, and for once political criticism is silent. There can be no doubt that the hon. gentleman will discharge his plenary duties of his mission in a most able and happy way.

There is an interesting struggle in progress for the Lieutenant-Governorship of the Province of Ontario. When Sir James MacInnes, of Victoria, who had been led to believe that he would be given a seat in the Cabinet, was thrown down last year, he was placated by the promise of the Lieutenant-Governorship of the Province. But there are now other aspirants in the field. Mr. Thompson, proprietor of the Victoria Times, and who was one of the defeated Liberal candidates in Victoria last June and Dr. Milne, also of Victoria, are aspirants.

DIDN'T KNOW IT WAS LOADED. Young Barnes Pulled the Trigger and Found One Cartridge in Condition. CORNWALL, June 8.—While several young men were amusing themselves in a grove on the south branch, near here, yesterday afternoon, one of the youngsters, who had a bad named Barnes, not knowing that it was loaded, pulled the trigger a couple of times. There happened to be one cartridge in the cylinder, and when this came round there was an explosion, and Dan McMillan had a 32-calibre bullet in his left shoulder. He was taken to McIntown and the ball probed for and removed. The wound is serious, but not fatal.

JEALOUSY AND DEATH. CAIRO, Ill., June 8.—Richard Caldwell, of Memphis shot and killed Mary Jenkins yesterday, because he was jealous of the favors she had bestowed on other men. Immediately after the shooting he fled to a lumber yard back of town, where he was found two hours later by the officers. He was ordered out with some difficulty, when he opened fire on the officers. His first shot passed through the series of Deputy Sheriff George W. Moore, who returned the fire, killing Caldwell instantly. Moore was acquitted of all blame by a coroner's jury last evening.

NARROW ESCAPE OF MINERS. MONROEVILLE, Pa., June 8.—By an explosion of gas in the Black Diamond Mine of the Brown Coal Company, two miles south of here, yesterday morning, several men were injured, and 800 barely escaped with their lives. The explosion occurred about 7 o'clock in the morning. A rescue party was immediately into the mine, and all of the men were taken out before they were overcome by the deadly afterdamp.

THE HAMILTON CONFERENCE.

Annual Meeting During the Week in the Beautiful City of Bradford. The annual session of Hamilton Conference of the Methodist Church was held in Bradford commencing on Wednesday, 2nd inst., and closing on Tuesday evening.

The report of the year's work was very gratifying in many respects. The number of members in the Conference is 44,016, an increase of 473. Number of ministers 174; probationers 39; supernumeraries 81; superannuated 6. Nine preachers were ordained. Within the conference bounds there are 256 local preachers; 99 exhortors; 1462 class leaders; 4218 societies; 1124 society representatives; 280 presidents of Epworth Leagues, and 417 Sunday school superintendents. The finances raised for circuit purposes was \$105,220.51, and for ministerial support \$127,605. The confessional funds were sustained as follows: Missions, \$30,370.35; superannuated ministers, \$8,647.24; education, \$3,011.53; general confessional fund, \$837.48; union church relief fund, \$698.00; contingent fund, \$81.15; Sunday school aid, \$377.45; sustentation fund, \$81.49; Epworth League, \$365.40; total confessional funds, \$52,550.26. Total raised for all purposes \$245,754.77.

The hospitality extended was of the most cordial character, and the citizens generally seemed to accept the delegates as guests of their beautiful city. The conference will meet next year in Guelph, on the first Thursday in June. Rev. Stephen Bond, at one time a minister at Acton, was elected President of London Conference. The transfer of Rev. Isaac Tovell from Hamilton to London Conference was effected last week. Rev. Jabez B. Saunders, M.D., D.D., was elected president of the Montreal conference on the second ballot. Rev. W. H. Sparling was elected secretary of the same conference on the first vote.

The seventeenth annual meeting of the Ontario Medical Association, was held in Toronto. A resolution passed expressing acquiescent disapproval of the scheme for the founding of a Victoria Order of Nurses.
