Hon. Sidney Fisher, Minister of Agriculture, writing to Miss Phelps, of St. Catharines, says that the question of direct taxation will not be mixed up with the prohibition plobiscite. "The whole fluanoial question in connection with it will not be decided at the present time. I can assure you that we will put the bill in one of the first in the coming session," he concludes.

The official statement of the finances of the Dominion for the fiscal year ending June 30, '97 has been given out. The revenue for 1896 was \$35,659,775.43, and for 1897 is \$36,872,170.52. The expenditure for 1896 was \$30,557,274.02, and for 1897 \$31,273,458.47. The expenditure on capital account in 1896 was \$3,755,826,22, for 1897 \$3,186,352.01. The postal revenue increased nearly \$300,000.

A report on the situation in Armenia, gregorian nobles, has just been made public. 

FIRE LIMIT BY-LAW

THE attention of the property owners of the municipality is again called to the provisions of the Fire By law respecting the erection of new buildings and re-building of old ones within the fire limits, as per the following clauses :- 2. Within the said fire limits every dwelling boroafter erected, chall be built of stone, bric coment or concrete, and roofed with slate, metal, tin, fireproof composition or shingles laid in mortar at least one-half an inch thick laid on roofing boards closely jointed, provided that within the said limits, stables and out-buildings may be creeted of wood, plastered or rough east on the outside and roofed as herein before provided.

3. Within the said limits all roofs hereinafter made or put on any building whether such building shall have been built before or after the passing of the by-law shall be made as hereinbefore provided for new roofs.

4. That within the said limits any renewal or removal of any frame or weeden building shall be considered a re-creation subject to the terms of this by-law, and that any repairs to any frame or weeden building which shall be necessary to execute to the extent of one-half of the whole value of the building shall be considered a re-creation and re-construction subject to the pre-visions of this by-law, and that all plans both for new buildings and repairs to buildings shall first be submitted to the Council for their approval, and a permit be optained from Council before proceeding with creation or repairs.

Notice is hereby given that in order to protect this municipality and to meet the requirements of the Beard of Underwriters, the above provisions will be strictly enforced.
