ODD WAGERS. The Queer Things That Men Have Staked Money On.

It is astonishing what queer things people will undertake to perform for the sake of winning a wager. A German man named Honrich Stott made a bet of \$1,250 that during the time between June 15, 1893, and January 1, 1896, he would walk through at least two countries of each of the five continents of the world, defraying the expenses of his journey with the money he carned en route. Stott had plenty of adventures on his journey. In Algiers he was arrested as a spy, but acquitted after being detained four months in prison. He finally won his

wager with some days to spare. Another unique performance was that ecently accomplished by a wealthy American named Hassam, of Cincinnati. This gentleman made a bet of \$5000 against \$10,000 that he would trundle a wheelbarrow 10,000 miles in 450 days under the following peculiar restrictions and couditions : He was to start from Cincipnati with only four cents in his possession, and he had to return within the time specified either with \$3000 in cash or a wife.

Ho had neither to beg, borrow nor steal any money during his journey, nor use any of his private fortune, but must earn the money to pay his way. He had to put up at the best hotel in every place at which he topped, and must pay not less than \$3 a day at each of them: The wager arose out. of a discussion as to the chance of obtainog work in the United States, the man who eventually laid the wager contending that money could always be made easily by one able and willing to work. It is interesting to learn that he won his bet, bringing home a wife and money also. Not long ago a Parisian student in order to win a bet swallowed five silk neckties. The event took place in a beer house just outside Paris. The conditions were that the neckties should be out into pieces and dressed as a salad with oil, salt, vinegar and pepper, and this original mixture should be swallowed within six minutes. The stu-

Some months ago a provincial bairdresser named Jacques won a bet of \$1000, which he had made with a rival, that he would, blindfolded, shave 80 men in an hour. He performed this remarkable foat in filty-nine minutes without inflicting a single cut. It is recorded that out of the \$1000 Jacques gave half to the deserving

Some years back a farmer at Kirton Lindsey, in Lincolnshire, undertook for a wager of a few pounds to ride a pony up two pair of stairs into a chamber of the George Inn, and down again; which feat he actually performed before a large company, whose astonishment was heightened

in weight, and his horse less than 600 pounds. They were weighed after the feat to decide another wager. A year or two ago, Professor Jules Gautier accomplished a remarkable feat in swimming from Folkestone to Dover, about eight miles, with his hands and feet mansoled. Although the sea was somewhat rough and unfavorable, Gautier started from the Victoria pier at Folkestone, at 12.10 p. m., in the presence of a large concourse of people, and successfully accomplished the distance, reaching Dover at
