The National Apple Shippers' Associa tion gives the Canadian percentage for 1897 as 40, based upon a full crop. In the eastern section of the United States there has been a considerable falling off, and in some Western States a decided increase On the whole this year's crop falls considerably below that of last year, but is about equal to the average.

The apple crop in Ontario will likely be a fair one. No such big yield is expected Guelph. however from the orchards in this province. as was experienced last year. There has been a sort of blight in a good many orchards such as has played havoc this season among the trees on the island of Montreal where fruit has fallen off the trees in large quantities. Advices from the Western States speak of a good average crop.

In the British House of Commons last week Sir Wilfrid Lawson, Liberal, in calling attention to the attitude of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain towards South Africa, classed the latter's policy as being "daugerous and obstructive to our reputation abroad." Referring to Mr. Cecil Rhodes, he remarked that the ex-Premier of Cape Colony was guilty of "treachery, betrayal of his sovereign and disloyalty to his colleagues."

Corrected tables about to be published by the United States Bureau of Statistics will show that the fiscal year ended June 30 was the largest in the history of domestic exports, the value of which reached \$1,032,-001;300. The next largest was the year 1892, when they amounted to \$1,015,752,-011. The increase over exports of the preceding year amounted to \$108,800,813. There has been a considerable increase in the exports of domestic manufactures:

The Saturday Reviewer has a theory about Japan's attitude on the Hawaiian question which impute to the eastern power a most Mephistophelian policy. Her protest against the annexation by the United States of Hawaii has little sin cerity in it. Two prospectors sent out on behalf of Glasgow company have cabled home that British Columbia will be the principal gold field of the world. They say that not a single mine in that territory has been dividends before the actual mining has commenced, and working costs are declining. There is work in that locality for 6,000 miners. It is probable, however, that no important exedns of English gold seekers will take place until spring.

The feeling of confidence hitherto noted in business circles in Ontario continues to increase, and prospects are of the most cheering character. The tone of markets is firmer, and with a large wheat crop in view at good prices, we may look forward to a good autumn trade. There are a good many orders being booked for staple dry goods, while grocers and hardware jobbers report an active trade. Remittances are fairly satisfactory, with improvement reported by nearly all wholesale dealers, se says a fluancial expert.

Thomas Ballantyne, Ex-Speaker of the Assembly, one of Canada's largest exporters of choese, says :- "Ontario will have the largest hay crop in twenty years and the vield of wheat and oats will be away above the average of late years. The weather is suitable for spring grains. Some damage was caused to fall wheat by late heavy rains, but they have done an immense good to root crops. I look for a great improvement in trade : in fact, prospects are exceedingly bright. Exports of cheese from Canada are much larger than last season, and prices are good."

The Chicago British News says :- That it never pays for the people to take the law into their own hands has just received emphatic confirmation at the hands of the governors of the states of Georgia, South Carolina and Virginia, where lynching, ospecially of helpless negroes, Lus largely prevailed. Let us hope that the voice of authority, coupled with that of experience. will avail to check and finally to put an end to this monstrous practice. Let the law deal out justice, not the mob. By the way, it is worthy of mention here that lynching is unknown in Great Britain and her colonies. A lynching in Canada would be such a rarity us to furnish food for con demnation to the press for weeks.
