INTERESTING EXPERIMENTS Results of Winter Wheat Experiments at the Ontario Agricul-

tural College, 1897. One hundred and eighty-nine plots have been devoted to winter wheat experiments this sesson at the Outario Agricultural College. Owing to the late harvest and the exceedingly wet weather this season no winter wheat bulletin can be issued this year in time to be of much service before

the period of wheat seeding is reached. In an experiment with pinety-one var ictics of winter wheat, grown under similar conditions in 1897, it is found that the seven varieties which stand highest in yield of grain per acre are the same seven varieties which have given the largest yield of grain per acre for four years, in succession. Tht following list gives the names of these seven varities with the average yield per acre this season :
