NOTES AND COMMENTS. .

Bradstreets says: Toronto merchants report the lurgest distribution of genera merchandise within a week for ten years, and free deliveries of grain, good prices, for which continue to stimulate interior buying. Considerable activity marks the merchandise movement at Montreal also and at Halifax there is a fairly good trade in general lines.

Word comes from Ottawa that a report has been received at the Department of Agriculture on the condition In which shipment of early apples in cold storage chamber, arrived at Glasgow. The shipper was Mr. Fowler of Brighton and Montreal, and the cablegram received states that the cold storage was a complete success, and that the apples returned the shipper a handsome profit.

The fact that six murder trials are set down for trial in Ontario this fall is dis tressing. The list includes the old man Convey at Woodstock, for mordering hired boy; Mrs. Sternaman, for killing her husband; James-Allison, for the murder of Mrs. Orr; W. H. Hammond, for wife murder ; Thompson the alleged Minden murderer; and that of the alleged accomplice of Troy in the Napance murder.

A curious suggestion has been made with the object of emphasizing the union of the British Empire, and is meeting with considerable favor. The idea is that, in place of such distinctive names as Canada, Australia, etc., etc., the designation of "British Empire" should be applied to all the countries under British rale. Under this plan Great Britain proper would be known as "British Empire-Central." Canada would be known as "British Empire North-

The British trade returns as showing the condition of Angle Canadian trade under the Dominion's new tariff regulations are still much discussed in England. Further enquiries show that although the lower customs rates have not yet had time to materially affect the large body of English trade with Canada, many enquiries are coming from houses which hitherto were unrepresented in Canadian business. The outlook for increased trade is most hopeful There was never a more auspicious time to push Canadian trade.

At last an official end has been put to the Greco-Turkish war, which really terminated some 15 weeks ago, by the Sultan on Sunday afternoon attaching his signature to the terms of peace. It took the ambassadors of the powers more than twice as long to arrange them as the actual hostilities lasted. At present the result of the struggle is a military victory. for the Sultan over Greece, and undoubtedly the Sultan hopes and intends to gain a reward for his latest act of complaisance in the shape of concessions in the matter

The London, Eng., Globe, in an editoria on the fatility of arbitration with a power "which disregards alike the legal prescriptions and ordinary courtesies of civilized nations," says; "Lord Salisbury has treated the United States with a kindness they do not deserve, always wearing the eilk glove, until America has forgotten the existence of the iron hand beneath The idea of our being afraid of a forth rate power like the United States could only have occurred to sufferers from a severe attack of swelled head. America has lost all sense of proportion, and has forgotten she plays only a minor role in the affairs

In referring to evidences of returning prosperity to Canada the Globe's report or Saturday pays this compliment: "No summary of the conditions, however, can so well as does the upanimity of their expressions in the course of the brief convorsations I have had with them at the different places. Where it is only at long intervals that one is found whose view differs from the general hopeful tone, he may be taken as the exception that proves the rule. It is worth mentioning in regard to quite a number of interviews I have had that the impression I derived from the men themselves was not nearly so favorable to the good times theory as were statemente made by the same gentlemen to their personal friends who repeated them to me. Political considerations, I have been led to believe are partly responsible for this minimizing of the truth. Stalwart Conservative prophets like Mr. Storey, of Acton, and some of the Berlin and Galt anniectorers were above this dispositio happily, and gave the news of good times with business-like sincority and courtesy."
