Considerable speculation has been incited about the Conservative leadership, owing to the visit of Sir Charles Tupper to Win pipeg. It is said that he goos there t offer the leadership of the Conservatives to Mr. Hugh John Macdonald.

Sir Louis Davies, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, has issued a circular to lumbermen on the Ottawa river, notifying them that there will be no further postponement of the law forbidding the dumping of sawdust into the river.

Mr. George Hague, general manager of the Merchants' Bank of Canada, has just returned to Montreal from the Northwest. He says, while the crop is not as heavy as last year, its extra quality and higher prices will make it twice as valuable.

The Normal College, formerly the School of Pedagogy, now removed to Hamilton, has accommodation for eighty students. The number of applicants for admission so far exceeds this number, however, that the Minister has decided to reject those under 21 years of age. This is claimed to be a step in the direction of more mature

Replying to the acquestion of inconsistency made against him for condemning the concert, the so-called concert of the powers, Mr. Gladstone writes :-- "In 1880 we tried to make the concert act and we failed and went on without it. We thus procured enlarged territory for Montenegro and Thessaly for Greece. This is exactly what I have desired as a mode of action in the East in these two disgraceful years. Compare the results."

The Politique Coloniale publishes a dispatch from St. Petersburg saying that, as a result of an exchange of views between the chancellors of St. Petersburg, Paris, Berlin, Vienna, Rome and Constantinople, the Sultan of Turkey will shortly address the powers on the subject of Great Britain's evacuation of Egypt, and Russia's supporting the Sultan will invite a conference at Constantinople or St. Petersburg, with the object of settling the question on the basis of the autonomy of Egypt under the suzerainty of the Sultan.

The growth of Christian Endeavor work in the Province of Ontario must be very gratifying to all who have the interest of the movement at heart. At Present Lord Chancellor of Ireland. London, Sept 27 .- A Dublin despatch

says it is reported on the highest authority that Baron Edward Gibson Ashbourne, Lord Chancellor of Ireland, will succeed the Earl of Aberdeen as Governor-General of Canada.

Lord Ashbourne, who has been Lord Chancellor of Ireland since 1805, was born December 4, 1837.
