DELICIOUS BOSTON BROWN BREAD.

In her cooking lesson in the Ladies' Home Journal Mrs. S. T. Rorer writes of "Breads and Bread-Making," and gives this, her favorite formula for making Boston brown bread : "Mir two on ps of Yankee rye meal, one cup of granulated yellow Indian meal and one cup of whole wheat flour. Add teaspoonful of salt, and sift. Discolve level teaspoonful of soda in about two tablespoonfuls of warm water ; add it to one and a half pints of thick sour milk, or butter-

milk. Then add to this one cup of molasses. When thoroughly blended pour it over the dry ingredients and mix thoroughly Pour into a greased two-quart brown bread mold, put on the lid tightly and steam contiguously for five hours. Lift the lid, allowing the bread to cool, and at serving time bake for thirty minutes."
