The post office and express office are the local branches of the departmental store and are busy rending off orders and handling

There are, perhaps, two banks in town and one closes at once, but the other waits to see how business will be. The editor of the local paper looks over his field and peers into the future, and then removes his plant to some place far from an over shadowing city. HOW ALUMINUM IS MADE.

The oxide, which is obtained from beuxite quarried by the company in Georgia, is fused with cryolite in pots of boiler-iron lined with carbon. An electric current is passed through these long series of pots, and the result is precisely similar to what it was when Hall first sent the seven-cell Grove battery current through his two-inch crucible in Oberlin-the melted aluminum collects on the carbon negative electrode, and, as already stated, the quantity thus collected daily is measured in tons. Continually, night and day, withont ceseation, this operation proceeds. The raw material is fed in as required : the product is removed and the carbon enewed. The waste of the process is said to be so slight as hardly to be an element of calculation.
