TERRIBLE DAMAGE DONE

The Town of Windsor, Nova Scotlo, Wiped Out on Bunday Morning. 4000 PEOPLE ARE HOMELESS

HALIFAX, N. S.; Oot. 18,-The town of Windsor is a waste of smoking ruins. A conflagration, which started in a barn tween: 1 and 2 o'clock yesterday morning, wept through the entire town, burning all day, and destroying nearly every building in the place. The condition of the inhabitants is most deplorable, few houses are left standing in the town and 4000 people were without shelter or food all day.

400 buildings were burned. The fire is supposed to have been started oy a drunken saloon keeper in a barn in the rear of the Marine Block, on Main street. A stiff gale was blowing from the northwest and the flames spread with awful rapidity, there being a conflagration of considerable proportions on hand-before the local fire brigade could get to work.

In a short time the fire was beyond control and swept through the business section sparing nothing. The firmes were carried thence all through the town, cating up Manitobh Cabinet will meet in a few days building after building in a twinkling. 
