

TO A BEGINNER IN BUSINESS.

A word to the young man preparing to open a store of his own: When you get ready to do business tell the public what you are going to do. Use plenty of adverising space to tell your story well and thoroughly, but tell it simply. Don't whoop. Don't turn verbal flip-flaps. Don't make a jumping-jack of the English language. Don't tear your hair and froth
