The Principal and Teachers of the Second and Third Departments Re-Engaged.

The Board of Trustees of Acton Public School met on Monday evening.

Members present, G. Hynde, Chairman; W. H. Storey, James McLean, Robert Wallace and Robert Holmes.

The Committee on Finance presented their fourth report, recommending payment of accounts as follows:—

George Hynde, repairs 3 00; Paul Coffey, cleaning 3 00; N. Forbes, repairing walls of school 3 00; J. A. Speight, 3 chairs 1 75; Mrs. Z. Moore, repairing clock 75; C. O. Speight, framing picture 60; Thos. Ebbage, water trough 75.

Moved by W. H. Storey, seconded by Robert Wallace, that the report of the Committee on Finance just read be adopted.—Carried.

Moved by W. H. Storey, seconded by James McLean, that Thos. E. Moore, teacher of the first department; Mrs. O. McNeill, teacher of the second department and Miss Ida E. Patterson, teacher of the third department, be re-engaged for the year 1898, at annual salaries as last year.—Carried.

It was ordered by the Board that the salary of a teacher for the fourth department, salary not to exceed \$200; certificate to be second class professional.

The Treasurer of the Board was authorized to collect fees from non-resident pupils at the rate of 50 cents per month.

Board then adjourned to meet on Monday evening, 15th November, at 7.30 o'clock.
