NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The Whitway Ministry was defeated in the general election in Newfoundland. The Premier and several of the Cabinet Ministers lost their seats.

The W. E. Sanford Manufacturing Co. of Hamilton, which, under the leadership of Messrs. J. D. and J. E. Sanford, has decided to restore to the old figure. Numerous other manufacturers throughout the Dominion have taken similar action in the past few weeks.

The millers appointed by the Dominion Government, to fit the flour standards, have completed their task. The important change is in connection with straight flour. Hereafter Manitoba wheat will not be allowed to be mixed with Ontario wheat for straight roller flour.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson is now Premier of New Brunswick, a reconstituted of the local Government having been elected last Friday on account of ill health. Hon. James Mitchell resigned the Premiership and Attorney-Generalship, and Governor McCrellan called upon Mr. Emmerson to form an administration.

The Toronto Star quotes the following as signs of better times in that city: Houses filling up, vacant good ones scarce, prices of land advancing, rents firm, bank clearances increasing, customs returns going up, need of more schools, factories working full or over time. Put on a cheerful look and talk hopefully.

The change to the new order of things is gratifying and promises much for the future of the country. Already we stand full in the gaze of the world as the most promising of the British colonies for emigration and it will not be long before the thousands of immigrants from the British Isles will be seeking our shores instead of the United States as heretofore. This is also gratifying.

Inspector W. H. Ballard of the Hamilton Public Schools, says that the latest American idea of making the daily newspaper a text-book in the schools for up-to-date history, geography, economics, etc., is well worth considering for Ontario, and if properly conducted would be exceedingly advantageous. As it is now, most of the Inspector's classes are following the Indian frontier with atlas, and it wouldn't be necessary to go very far to adopt the scheme in its entirety.

The Ontario Legislature will meet for the despatch of business on Tuesday, Nov. 5th. It is a long time since it met so early. Since Confederation only four sessions have been earlier in the fiscal year than the one now pending. The Government, no doubt, are anxious to obtain the sense of the House on the log and lumber question at as early a date as possible. It is yet to soon to speculate as to the nature of the legislation that the house may bring down, but it is not likely to be of a very important nature.

VERY DEAR SPORT.
Two United States Sportsmen Heavily Fined for Violating Game Laws.

Toronto, Oct. 27.—For some years United States hunters have been in the habit of going north and killing without a license. This practice has been so common that the game laws of Ontario have been amended so that any person who kills a game animal without a license is liable to a fine of \$50.

Two sportsmen from the United States were recently fined for violating the Ontario game laws. They were caught while hunting in the province without the necessary license.

The sportsmen were fined \$50 each for hunting without a license. The court found them guilty of the offence and imposed the penalty.

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TAMMANY WINS ANOTHER VICTORY.

Van Wyck Elected Mayor of Greater New York by a Plurality of 75,000.

New York, Nov. 3.—Tammany won in the Greater New York election yesterday, and Mr. Van Wyck becomes Mayor of the consolidated city by a plurality estimated at seventy-five thousand.

It was a notable contest, second only in the interest which it challenged to a Presidential election. What gave it almost national importance was the tremendous power which the Tammany machine, coupled with the intricacies of the electoral situation, enhanced, and as they were, by the determination of a powerful organization to save the city from what is technically known as the machine.

SOTHERED TO DEATH.
A Distrofing Fatal Accident at Oakville.

Oakville, Oct. 30.—A distressing accident occurred here yesterday morning at 11.30, whereby Willie, the sixteen year old son of David White, lost his life. The young lad was a driver for Mr. John Wales and had gone down to the latter's storehouse where they were loading the schooner Van Stratten. He jumped in the bin while playing with some other boys and at that moment the chute opened and he fell below. The chute carried him down and before the chug could be closed he disappeared and was smothered to death before he was rescued.
