THE PROHIBITION PLEBISCIT A Bill: to be Submitted at the Next Bession of Parliament.

OTTAWA, Jan. 10-Instructions have been given by the Government for the preparation of a bill for the taking of a vote throughout Canada on the question of the prohibition of the liquor truffic. Such a measure was promised last session, but owing to the difficulty of determining the shape in which the question should be put to the electors, and the fact that the Premier had to hurry away to London to attend the jubilee celebrations, action was deferred. The Government sees it cannot possibly postpone the matter beyond the present ression, and hence it is now having a druft bill drawn up to submit to Parlia ment. The intention is to submit the question only to such persons as are qualified to vote in Dominion elections. The vote will be brought on at such time us the conflicting interests can agree upon, or falling agreement, at a date the Government will name. At present it is thought that the fall of the year, about the middle of October; would be the most suitable

The main difference of opinion is th shape in which the question should go the people. The liquor interests have futl mated that they want three questions submitted: as follows:--

1. Are you in favor of the total prohib tion of the importation, manufacture and galos of intoxicating liquors ? 2. Are you in favor of compensation

manufacturers and vendors of liquors in the event of prohibition? 8. Are you in favor of direct taxation t recoup the treasury for the loss of revenue consequent upon prohibition?




