The announcement is made that the Manitoba Provincial Legislature will be called together on Thursday, March 10. The Ministers say that at present there seems to be very little legislation required,

That England has been brought into closer touch with Canada is apparent by the need for increased facilities for transport. The Dominion Steamship Company will run a weekly instead of a fortnightly passenger service between Montreal and Liverpool during the coming season, and a new twin screw steamer of 6,000 tons, the Dominion, will be placed on the service.

A new preferential tariff has proved its benefit to Canada. Trade with Great Britain has increased each way. During January imports from Canada increased \$147,582, or 82 per cent., compared with January 1897. The chief increases were Animals, 7000; wheat, £85,000; wheat flour, £4,000; bacon, £4,000; butter £3,000; cheese, £86,000; eggs, £2,000; fish, 000, and hams, £5,000. The experts to Canada incocased nearly seven per cent.

Sir Charles Dilke in an article in British dailies entitled, "Why We Need au Army, embodies this utterance: "It is probabl that in any general European war which we engage the United States will noutral and will free us from too close attention to the defence of Canada.
