provide for the manufacture of tuberculin was ordered at once, and the bacteriologist, to commence work. The first 14 doses were sent out about the end of last May and since that time the demand has increased so rapidly that it was found necessary to order an additional incubator and add a room to the laboratory. With these additions, it is hoped to be able to supply what is regalred in the province. The work in the department of field experiments is growing in importance from year to year. The experiments with varieties of wheat, oats, barley, peas; corn turnips, mangels, potatose, carrote, green fodders, grasses, clovers, mixtures of grain etc., have been carried on systematically and persistently on well defined lines for seven or eight years, on plots in different parts of a fifty acrofield, and under climatic

best adapted to the soil and climate of the college farm; and the co-operative experiments throughout the province, carried on simultaneously by the College Experimental Union (largely under the direction of the Expermentalist, Mr. C. A.
