THE GOLDEN KLONDIKE AN ENORMOUS RUSH OF GOL SEEKERS GOING IN.

Some Sound Advice from One .Who Has Made the Trip, and Knows | persons) from Chicago to California. Something of the Hardships the Gold Seekers Must Undergo.

In the rush towards the golden fields of the Klondike there are thousands who ar illatted to stand the strain and exposure which are inseparable from that trip. Ill ness, disease and death is almost certain to claim many of the ill-prepared adventurers. The following letter from one who

BEAGWAY, Dec, 12th, 1807. DEAR SINS .- My object in writing this letter is to give a word of advice to those. who contemplate going to the gold fields. For ten years I have followed the occupation of prospecting, timber estimating and mining, and the hardships and privations which one has to undergo, are enough to wreck the strongest constitution. In the spring of 1807 I was stricken with pleurisy as the result of exposure. 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
