to this municipality. Much of the pro-
gress and prosperity of the village is due
to his zeal and the deep interest he at
all times took in everything that affected
the welfare of the citizens. The deceased
was widely known and respected, indeed
he commanded the confidence of his fellow-
citizens to the same extent. As a citizen
he was a valuable member of this commu-
nity kindly, diligent and honorable in all
his dealings and always ready to assist in
any philanthropic movement. As colleague
we desire to record our sympathy and
impartially during his occupancy of the
Reeve'ship. Those associated with him in
municipal matters felt keenly his removal.
But his loss, great as it is to his colleagues
and to the village, falls with peculiar
severity on his estimable family. Most
respectfully and tenderly would we convey
to Mrs. Story and family our sense of the
great bereavement we have been called
upon to undergo. We trust and pray that
Divine consolation may be granted them
under trial so great and in passing through
a sorrow so deep.
