Hon. Mr. Fielding made his budget speech on Tuesday. There is only one tariff change, outside of the preferential clauses, and that is the sugar duties are increased from fifty cents per hundred pounds to a bout sixty-five cents per hundred pounds.

Hon. W. S. Fielding, Finance Minister delivered his annual budget speech in the House at Ottawa last week. The total amount voted for the current year was \$45,980,728, and the total amount asked for this year is \$44,912,571 or a decrease of \$1,068,152,

A Grand Trunk official expressed the opinion Monday morning that the present rate war would ultimately result in a permanaent rate of two cents a mile. This is supported by the recent increase in total receipts, showing that the travel caused by out rates more than recoups the roads for the reductions .- Toronto Star.

The Government has decided to reduce the interest in the Government Savinge Bank from three per cent: to two and half per cent. The reason for this is principally due to the fact that money can be borrowed for about this amount, and therefore the Government generally tries to keep the interest at the amount for which money can be obtained.

An insolvency bill has been introduced in the House of Commons. Mr. Fortin, who introduced the bill. said that it had been prepared under the supervision of the Montreal Board of Trade, assisted by Messro. A. S. Kent and Mr. Stevenson, who are authorities on the subject. The ressure embodies many of the provisions of Sir McKenzie Bowell's Bill passed by the senatein 1894 and reintroduced in 1895. It is limited in its application to traders. 


