Then, after all the folks have gone go up into your bedroom and take your watch to pieces and examine it well, to see you can tell what is the matter with it If you can't see anything wrong, file a little here and there and take out a jewel or two and turn them upside down in case something might have been wrong. A good many watchmakers do like that. Then for fear the folks might be home from church before you get it finished you had better commence putting it together; and after repeated trials and a great deal of bad

anguage, it would be as well to put all the confounded little screws and other things could not find a place for into your ha or handkerchief and bring them to pringle the watchmaker, in guelph, where you ought to have brought the watch in the first place. There are some things you can do better than pringle, but you cannot fix your watch as well as he can. This is pringle's twenty-eighth year in guelph. His success is due to good workmanship and his personal attention to every job which comes into his shop. No job, however small, is allowed to leave until inspected and found correct. Once in a while a mistake may be made, but no one can be more careful than pringle.

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
