They provide for free miner's certificates and the staking of claims, the definition of a vein, and all other matters necessary to govern quartz

An extra of the Canada Gazette contains a prodamation putting in force the Foreign Enlishment Act. Further it orders that the warships of Spain and the United States shall not remain in a Canadian port longer than twenty-four hours, and that such ships shall take on only such quantity of coal or supplies as shall be sufficient to provide for such foreign ships to proceed to the nearest port of their own country.

In Canada the note circulation during March was \$85,980,085, compared with \$81,082,521 in the same month last year. In March, 1897, there were in the chartered banks deposits of \$67,467,616 payable on demand, and \$126,191,846 payable after notice, a total of \$198,648,571. Last March these deposits had increased to \$76,471,070 payable on demand, and \$140,525,489 after notice. The increase is over \$28,000,000.

PERMANENT PAVEMENTS.

Much Cheaper and More Desirable Than Plank Walks.

An exchange gives some information about sidewalks which, if reliable, should revolutionize the present method of making walks in the towns and cities of Canada.

Nobody denies that granolithic sidewalks are immensely superior to plank sidewalks. The chief objection to the granolithic or alleged to be so much dearer than the the boards applied to. plank. But what if granolithic can be laid down at as low a cost as plank? In Ottawa it has been discovered that this can be done. As a matter of fact it has been ascertaiced, after studying the tenders submitted for the construction of sidewalks, that granolithio will be cheaper

than planks as sidewalk material this year. The Ottawa Journal gives these comparative figures showing the cost of the two classes of walks : Last year a five-foot plank sidewalk cost 42 cents, and granolithic "iron facing" 4 8-5 cents per foot frontage. This year the figures are: Plank, 4 4-5 cents; granolithic 4 1-12 cents. A six foot sidewalk, plank, last year cost 6 cents and granolithic, iron facing, 6 1-6 cents. This year plank costs 6 1-6 cents and granolithic 5 1-2 cents. An eight-foot plank sidewalk last year cost eight cents and artificial stone, curb facing, 10 1-5

cents. This year the figures for both sidewalks are the same, 8 8-5 cents. While the plank sidewalk is guaranteed for only five years, the granolithic for

NEW FRANCHISE ACT TO RULE Orrawa, April'27 .- There shall be submitted to the vote of the electors hereinafter declared entitled to vote therein the following queetion: Are you in favor of the passing of an act prohibiting the importation, manufacture or sale of spirits, wine, ale, beer, older and all other alcoholis quors for use as beverages?

This is the salient clause of the probibi tion plebisaite bill, as introduced last week by Hon. Sidney Fisher.





Inspector will commence a general inspection, and further take notice that the section of the Public Health Act prohibiting the keeping of hogs, between the 15th of May and the 1st of November, except in pens at least 70 feet from any dwalling house and 50 feet from any street or lane, with the floors kept fees from standing water and regularly cleansed, will be strictly.

All citizens are carnestly requested to keep their premises constantly clean and theroughly

1. The Librarian shall, under the direction of The Free Library Board, have the charge and superintendence of the Library, and shall be responsible for the care and safety of all the books and other public property contained in Residents or ratepayers of Acton and vicinity not under 14 years of age, known to the Librarian, or vouched for by responsible citizens, can draw books on registering their names and residence, and agreeing to conform to the Rules and Regulations adopted by the Board. The Librarian, when it is deemed necessary, may require a special deposit.

equire a special deposi 3. Only one book can be drawn at a time. No book can be kept longer than two weeks, but a book may be redrawn once for the same period, unless it has in the meantime been applied for Books of Reference cannot be taken from

5. A fine of five cents for each day, up to the value of the volume, will be imposed for detaining a book longer than the time allowed by the rules. Fines will also be imposed for turning down leaves, marking, or in any other way injuring or defacing a book. For the destruction or loss of a book a fine shall be imposed upon the member equal to the value of the book. 5. No one will be permitted to take books from the chelves except the Librarian and members of The Free Library Board. 7. Noise and lond conversation at the Library Rooms are strictly prohibite 8. The use of tobacco is prohibited in Library. 9. The Library shall be open on Monday Wednesday and Saturday from 7 to 8.30 p. m. 10. Any person incurring a fine may draw once after the penalty is incurred, but the card will be retained, and the further privileges of the Library suspended, until such fine be paid.

11. No book shall be retained or laid saide by the Librarian for any reader, and all books, be-fore being re-issued, shall be placed on the shelves. 19. No book shall be issued unless the Library card is presented at the time of drawing. 14. It shall be the duty of the Librarian to enforce all Regulations, and to collect all fines and pay over same, monthly, to the Secretary.

15. The charge for Library Cards shall be five cents, and for a copy of the Catalogue ten cents.

16. These regulations or any of them, may be repealed or amended, and new regulations may be made at any regular meeting of The Free Library Board, a majority of the Boar I concurring. Adopted 10th April, 1803.
