Honorable gentlemen, who are urging Great Britain to declare a preferentia daty in favor of Canadian food stuffe might take a day off occasionally and urge the C. P. R. to reduce its freight rates or western Canada's cereals. They would thus vary their labors and be quite as likely to succeed.

At a Cabinet meeting on Saturday the Government decided that if possible the session of Parliament shall close within the next two weeks. Mr. Blair and Mr. Tarte will leave for Europe immediately after the close of the session. Sir Charles Tupper expects to leave for London on May 29th, and Mr. Foster has arranged to go cut to the coast early in June.

A new resolution just passed by the House of Commons reads: "That on and after July 1st next the salaries of the judges and Court of York, shall be \$2000 per annum during the first three years of service, and after three years of service each \$2400 per appum." In addition to this amount all judges receive travelling allowances of \$200.

If there is anything that could make the conquest of Canada easy for Uncle Sam, it is the foolish belief, fostered by so many people, that such a conquest is impossible. The Chinese believed that China was unconquerable, and calmly secure in that flotion, they sat back and permitted themselves to be defeated by the Japs. Canada's truest safeguard is a knowledge that Canada is conquerable, coupled with an iron resolve that the conquest shall never be allowed.

The reluctance among Americans to volunteer for the war must not be attributed to cowardice, for the Yankees are without doubt among the very best fighters in the world. It is one thing, however, to fight for the defence of one's country and mnother thing to face starvation, malaria and yellow fever in the awamps and jungles of Cuba, for the glory and profit of the politicians and the Yellow newspapers. If President McKinley could force a conscription in the balls of Congress, and among the editors, reporters and proprietors of the "New Journalism," he would rid the country of the most pestilent section of its population.

TO-DAY'S WAR NEWS NOT EXCITING.

he Fleets Have Not Yet Come Into Conflict--Campaign to be Centered in Cuba.

THE WHOLE U.S. FORCE TO ACT THERE. WASHINGTON, May 18 .- The official bulletin boards to-day failed to yield any news of the movements of three fleats,-Sampson's, Sahley's and the Spanish Sying equadron, and there is reason to believe that the department itself has received no information on that point. No report has reached the Navy Department to indicate that disaster has overtaken any of the American vessels engaged in the removal of Spain's torpedoes at Cardenas. If one was blown up, it could have been nothing more than a steam launch at most, for that is class of boats employed in such work. The department has no information of any such accident.

WASHINGTON, May 18th .- The Govern ment has decided upon an immediate military campaign in Caba. In th opinion of the Administration the nav situation has so changed as to warran landing troops in the island, despite th fact, that the Spanish fleet has not yet been defeated. The determination t begin the military operations at once was reached at the Cabinet meeting yesferday The President and his advisers are opposed to pursuing a temporizing policy in the war with Spain, and emphatic objections exist against allowing che clusive fleet of the Spanish to figure any longer as a cause for postponing the military occupa-

tion of Cuba: The change in the naval situation, which, in the opinion of the Administration, warrants a radical change in the plan of campaign immediately, is the gathering of nearly the whole naval force of the United States in the vicinity of Cuba Since Commodore Schley's squadron sailed for the south, and Admiral Sampson's squadron started westward for Porto Rico, the Administration has reached the conclusion that it will be possible. with the combined naval force, not only to deal with the enemy's fleet conclusively at the proper time, but amply to protect the transportation of military forces to the

-The Administration will wait until the equadrons of Sampson and Sohley and Watson have come together in Cuban waters, and have assumed such position with reference to one another and to approaches to the island as they choose, before ordering the troops to leave the United States. It is evident therefore that the military occupation, although it has been decided on as a measure no longer dependent on the position of Spain's fleet, will not begin within the next few days. The United States troops will probably not leave the gulf coast before the end of a week. The Government has no fear that the naval forces will not be able to protect the troops during their transportation to the island, and to maintain safe communication for the army with its base of supplies in the

United States.
