SPAIN HOPELESSLY CRIPPLED. The past week has been the most event al since the commencement of the war with Spain. On Friday General, Bhafter moved on Santiago with his land forces and though considerable advance was made it was with terrible loss of life. Tho United States army lost over a thousand killed and wounded. General Shafter is now awaiting reinforcements at a point about six miles from the city. In the meantime the Spainiards have been rein-

forced at the city by some 6000 troops. On Sunday morning Admiral Sampson repeated the action of Admiral Dewey at Manilla on the 10th May, by wiping out General Cervera's fleet at Bantiago as they attempted to get out of the harbor, Every vessel was destroyed.
