Beautiful Sarcophagus.

The Guelph Mercury says "The sarcoph agus to be placed at the head of the grave of the late W. H. Storey, Acton, is completed at the marble yard of Mr. J. H. Hamilton, and is one of the most attractive monuments ever turned out from a Guelph yard. The sarcophagus is of the beautiful 'Hill o' Fare' granite, Aberdeensbire, Scotland. The bottom base is 5 ft. 6 in long and three feet wide. Across the top of the foot-marker is the word 'Father,' and on its face the inscription 'There is no death; what seems so is transition. This life of mortal breath is but a suburb of the life Elysian, whose portals we call death. The tablet is four feet square by 18 inches bick and the lettering is raised-in fact the whole lettering on the sarcophagus is raised-a difficult work to perform on hard granite, and their polished faces look very beautiful on the frosted background Inside the border, near the two corners are two maple leaves on each side. The inscription is "In loving memory of William Heslop Storey, who died March 6 1808, aged 61 years; a native of Ayton, Yorkshire, England." Above the inscription are the words. "He being dead, yet speaketh." On the cup, with a scroll ach side, is the emblem of the Woodmen of the World, of which the deceased was

### ELECTRIC LIGHT EXPERIENCE.

Newmarket Puts in a Municipi Plant, Pays Running Expenses, Debenture Principal and Interest and Saves \$395 In Taxes, the First Year.

The Newmarket Era gives the following interesting particulars relative to its electric light plant put in a year ago by the

municipality :--

Ever since the Electric Light By-law was carried by the vote of the people there has been an anxious fear on the part of the minority that it was going to increase the burden of taxation; and the numerous bills presented to the council for electrical supplier, coal and wood, raised quite a suspicion in the minds of many who supported the enterprise that it would not give the financial return that its promoters advocated. In order to ascertain the exact position of affairs, Mr. J. A. Bastedo, competent accountant, was instructed to go thoroughly into the matter and ascertain every detail of expenditure and income. This occupied a good deal of time during

the past three weeks and his report was

presented to the council last Monday even-

ing, when much satisfaction was expressed at the result. Before putting in the electric plant the town was paying \$500 per annum for street lighting, and only 12 are lights were] used. For the year 1897 the revenue from incandescent lighting paid all running expenses, the principal and interest on the debenture debt for this purpose for the year, and it only cost the town \$205 for the lighting of the streets by 28 arc lights, which sam also includes the lighting of the council chamber, town hall and caretaker's residence. 


