Omnious news comes from the East. A despatch to old London reports that the Japanese Government has ordered the four warships to proceed to Saiseho, to reenforce the squadron already there. Also, the commander is instructed to co-operate with the admirals of the British and U. S. flecte in the event of international complioations. The despatch is not altogether explicit, but it is inferred that the squadrons are to be held in readiness for operations in the Philippines.

A government return gives the Indian population of Canada as 99,864, and they are scattered through all its provinces. Nearly three-quarters of the whole number balong to some religious denomination, the Catholics numbering 41,818, the Anglicaus 16,139, and the Methodists 10,203, the rest being divided among other Christian bodies. Of those not registered in religious sects about 16,000 are pagans, probably keeping up some form of native worship but making no particular display thereo and eluding statistical tabulations. From an industrial point of view the Canadian Indians make quite a respectable showing their ournings last year footing up about \$2,500,000.

In order to help the farmer of the West dispose of his output at once, the Canadian Pacific will this year allow him to load directly into grain cars; the following annoucement to that effect having been posted: "Cummencing with this year's crop the Canadian Pacific Railway Company will furnish oars to producers of grain to be loaded directly from waggons, provided there will be no unreasonable delay about loading the cars." This circular will be welcomed by many thousand of Western farmers, who have hitherto been denied the privilege of loading direct on cars at points where elevators exist. Latest reports show that this year's crop will be tremendous.

Canada has for two years been constantly rejoicing in increasing prosperity. There have been evidences in one quarter o another of the progress the Dominion has been making. Rallway companies, banks. steamship companies, inland transports tion companies, manufacturing corpora tions, exporting and importing merchants have all been preparing statistical and other reports of the results of their operations weekly, monthly or yearly, which have been uniformly of the most favorable character. The crops have been good, and prices have been, on the whole, highly profitable for grain, as well as for cheese and butter, so that agriculture has been better rewarded than for years, and our farmers have been relieved of heavy financial burdens which they have borne with exemplary patience. The timber trade has been very fair ; counting the results of the pulp industry, perhaps as profitable all round as formerly, though perhaps the saw mill operators have not been as well rewarded as formerly. Canadians therefore were not surprised to hear that the official returns of the fiscal year ending on the thirtieth of Jano last have been greater by far than in any other year of its existence .- Montreal


