Insty-two Varieties of Fall When Average 42.9 Bushels to the Acre.

Guerry, Aug 12 .- The winter wheat

grown on the plots at the Agricultural College is now all harvested and threshed. There were in all about 200 separate plots of winter wheat this year, and the results are certainly very satisfactory. Mr. Zabity states that the average yield of the 92 varieties grown this year is 42.9 bushels per sore. This yield has been surpassed only twice within the past pine years, namely, in 1891 and 1894. The large 26 acre field of Dawson's Golden. Chaff and farm, which is now partly threshed, vielding about 87 bushels per acre. The quality of the grain grown on the plots is excellent, the average weight per measured bushel of the 92 varieties being exactly 63 pounds. This is 2 4.5 pounds per bush el more than the average for the past nine years, Mr. Zavitz is of the opinion that the quality of winter wheat throughout Ontario this year will be above the stan dard, and that the average yield will likely be above five bushels per acre more than the average of the past ten years.
