

BY-LAW NO. ---

BY-LAW to provide for manufacturing and supplying Electric Lighting within the Corporation Limits of the Village of Acton, and to create a debt of Six Thousand Dollars on and by the issue of debentures for such purpose.

WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Acton consider it expedient to make provision for the manufacture and supply for the use of the Corporation and others of electric light within the said municipality and for the issue and sale of debentures to raise money to pay for same. AND WHEREAS it is estimated that it will be necessary for the said Corporation of the Village of Acton to borrow for the purpose aforesaid SIX THOUSAND DOLLARS and for that purpose to laute its debentures for that sum and such debt and the debentures to be issued therefor shall be made payable in twenty years from the day on which this By-law shall take effect.

AND WHEREAS it will require the certain specific sum of TWO HUNDRED AND FORT DOLLARS to be raised annually for the parties of interest during the currency of the said debentures and also a certain specific sum of TWO HUNDRED AND TWO DOLLARS to be raised annually for the payment of the principal money of the said debt, which sums are hereby settled as being sufficient for the purposes aforesaid and in settling the sum to be raised annually for the payment of the principal money of the said debt the rate of interest on investments has been estimated at no more on investments has been estimated at no more than four per cent per annum to be capitalise

AND WHEREAS the total amount required to be raised annually by special rate for payment of said debt is FOUR HUNDRED AND FORTY-TWO DOLLARS; AND WHEREAS the whole rateable property in the Municipality of the Village of Acton was, according to the last revised assessment roll, the sum of TWO HUNDRED AND RIGHTY-ONE THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED AND FIFTEEN DOLLARS;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the said Municipality is for principal money the sum of FIFTEEN THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED AND NINETY DOLLARS; AND WHEREAS there is no part of such

AND WHEREAS this by law has received the assent of the electors of the said municipality before the final passing thereof; THEREFORE the Corporation of the Village of Acton by the Council thereof by virtue of the powers in them in that behalf vected enacts as

1. That the said Corporation shall manufacture and supply for the use of the corporation and others electric light and for such purposes may construct, purchase, improve, extend, hold maintain, manage and conduct any works which they deem requisite therefor and may also acquire any patent or other rights for the manufacture or production of any artificial light and may also supply, sell or lease all fittings, machines, apparatus, metres or other things for the purposes aforesaid and may also rent or purchase such land and buildings as to the Corporation shall seem necessary or advantageous for the purposes aforesaid.

2. For the purposes aforesaid a debt of SIX THOUSAND DOLLIAES shall be created by the said Municipal Corporation and to raise the said money the said Municipal Corporation may issue and dispose of its debentures for the said sum of SIX THOUSAND DOLLIAES the proceeds thereof to be applied for the purposes aforesaid which debentures shall be scaled with the corporate seal of the said municipal corporation and shall be signed by the Beeve thereof and countersigned by the Treasurer thereof and shall have attached thereto coupons for the payment of interest. 8. The said Debentures shall be made payable in sums of not less than ONE RUNDRED DOLLARS each at the expiration of twenty years from the day appointed for this by-law to take effect at the office of the Treasurer of the Village of Auton.

4. The said Debentures shall bear interest at the rate of four percentum per annum payable half yearly from the date thereof on the 30th day of June and slat day of December in such year at the office of the said Treasurer. year at the office of the said Treasurer.

5. And for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of the said debentured the said certain specific sum of TWO HUN. DRED AND TWO DOLLARS and for the purpose of paying the interest upon the said debt the certain specific sum of TWO HUNDERD AND FORTY DOLLARS making specific the sum of FOUR HUNDERD AND FORTY TWO DOLLARS, shall be raised, isvied and collected in each year during the continuation of the said debentures or any of them by special rate sufficient therefor, on all the rateable property in the said Municipality, such annual special rate to begin from the date, when this by-law takes effect.

This by law shall take affect and go into operation on the day of its passing its third reading.

The votes of the electors of the said Village hereon shall be taken on the Fourth day of November, 1898, at nine colook in the forencon, as the following polling places in the said village of Actor and by the following Deputy Returning Officers respectively:—

Polling Bubdivision No. 1-At the Town Hall, H. P. Moore, Deputy Returning Officer. Polling Subdivision No. 2-At the Shop of Charles Speight, J. C. Hill, Deputy Returning Officer.

The Clerk of the Village Council shall sum up the number of voice given for and against this By-law on the fifth day of November, 1808, as the hour of eleven plotok in the forenoon at the Town Hall in the said village. The twenty-night day of October, 1808, at the hour of Temby like clock in the forencen at the Town Hall, is hereby fixed as the time and place for the appointment of persons to attend at the various polling places and at the final summing up of the votes by the Village Gerk respectively on behalf of the persons interested in the promoting or opposing the passing of this by-law respectively.
