A BY-LAW to provide for manufacturing and supplying Electric Lighting within the Corporation Limits of the Village of Acton, and to create a debt of Six Thousand Dollars on and by the issue of debentures for such purpose.

Whereas the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Acton consider it expedient to make provision for the manufacture and supply for the use of the Corporation and others of electric light within the said municipality and for the issue and sale of debentures to raise money to pay for same. AND WHEREAS it is estimated that it will be necessary for the said Corporation of the Village of Acton to borrow for the purpose aforesaid SIX THOUSAND DOLLARS and for that purpose to issue its debentures for that sum and such debt and the debentures to be issued therefor shall be made payable in twenty years from the day on which this By-law shall take effect.
