THE ELECTION TO-MORROW.

The property owners of Aoton will vote to-morrow on the by-law to provide for manufacturing and supplying electric lighting by the corporation. If there is any opposition to the by-law it is being very quietly expressed, and no persons presented themselves at the town hall on Saturday for appointment at the polling places on election day to oppose the passing of the by-law. In all probability the by law will pass with a large majority, as has been the case in each municipality in the province where electric lighting was voted upon with a view to placing it under municipal control.

Those who have looked into the question critically are perfectly satisfied that an electric lighting system will not only be self-sustaining, but that it will be a source of revenue to the corporation. Some, however, may be less sanguine, and fear that the plant, will need to be sustained by taxation. Granting for the moment that such a contingency might arise it will be well to agertain what the cost will be to the town. The by-law antioipates the sum of \$442 to be raised annually for the payment of principal and interest to meet the debentures proposed to be issued. Our present street lighting with coal oil lamps is estimated to cost \$200 per year but, in order to make the case as unfavorable as possible, place the present annual cost at \$160. This, deducted from the \$442 would leave \$282 per year to raise by taxation for this purpose, requiring exactly one mill of an advance in taxes to cover it. On an assessment of \$1000 the electric lighting by-law would in that case entail upon the owner of the property an increased expenditure for taxes of \$1.00 per year. Considerable of the property in town is, however, assessed at \$500 or under, so that the extra cost to such ratepayers for the introduction of electric light under municipal control, in case there was no profit to the corporation from the revenues to be derived, would be fifty cents each or less per

Why, numbers of residents on Mill and Main Streets paid that sum the past summer weekly to have the streets sprinkled.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The plebisoite returns for Quebec are now regarded by the Alliance officers as complete with an anti-prohibition majority of 98,099. This deducted from the prohibition majority of the balance of the Dominion, which is placed at 106,997 leaves the net majority for prohibition 13,888. The Dominion Alliance deputation will appeal to the Dominion Government at Ottawa to-day for a prohibitory law on the basis of that majority.

At a meeting of the Allied Trades and Labor Council last week at Ottawa the following platform was drawn up and adopted, and will be placed before prospective candidates for municipal honors The adoption of day labor : 2nd, the work ing day of nine hours, and sixdays a week; 3rd, a minimum living wage based on local abolition of property qualification for voters in all municipal elections, and right to vote to give the right to represent.

The unscating of Mr. Barber, the mem ber-elect for Halton, leaves that constitnency orice more open to contest. It is to be regretted that by the indiscretion of some over-zealous followers Halton should have to face once more the turmuil and trouble of an election day. But Mr. Barber is a strong man : his large business interests in the county, his personal popu larity and the conviction that he is the right man in the right place will see his once more occupy the seat which he has but temporarily lost .- Guelph Mercury.


