to the bushel. The yields of the various grains were as follows :-Fall wheat, 25,158,713 bushels, or 24 bushel. Spring wheat, 6,873 785 bushels, or 17.7. Barley, 12,663,668 bashels, or 28,9. Oats, 86,858,203 bushols, or 86.6. Hye, 2,673,234 bushels, or 16.2. Peas, 13,521,263 bushels, or 15.6.

Buckwheat, 2,373,615 bushels or 15.8. Beans, 759,659 bushels, or 16.8. Potatoes, 14,358,625 bushels, or 84. Mangel wurtzels, 21,957,546, or 458. Carrots, 4,313,861 bushels, or 347.
