Bome prospective users of electric current find it difficult to reconcile the difference in the varied schedule of rates fixed for stores, private dwellings and churches. Merchants who put in electric lights expect to use every lamp the entire time the current is on while their stores are open, whereas in private residences the lamps will seldom or never be all turned on at the same time, and not more than one-half or one-third of them be in constant use. The special rates to churches is based upon the fact that the auditorium, where the bulk of the lights are placed, except on special occasions arising on an average not once a month, is lighted only for Sunday evening service, a duration of about an hour and a half. Year's Day. Offawa, Jan. 2nd .- Canadians may now use the two-cent postage stamps for posting letters to any point in the dominion and to the United States, as well as to British points.

The Christmas box of interimperia penny postage has been followed by a New Year's gift of a two-cent letter rate throughout all Canada, beginning on Janusry 1. Last season the Government, anticipating the adoption of interimperial penny postage secured the passage of a permissive act, authorizing them when they deemed it advisable to reduce the Canadian letter rate to two cents, and upon the London conference last fall naming Christmas as the day upon which Imperial ponny postage should take effect, the Canadian government decided to avail themselves of the powers conferred upon them and reduce the Canadian domest letter rate from three to two cents at the

earliest possible moment. By the terms of the postal arrangement with the United States the reduction will apply to letters from Canada to that






