The magistrates of Halton County are being depleted very considerably by death. The Crown Attorney reports to the department the death of five during the year. These were W. H. Storey, Acton, Robert Balmer and John Husband, of Oakville, Abraham Stinson, of Nelson and Wm. Moore, of Esquesing.

In speaking of Ontario's grain-supply-Mr. Scott, manager of the McKay Milling Company, stated that grain of all kinds was very plentiful but the majority of the farmers, being now in easy olroumstances, are holding their stock for higher prices. This will not effect the price of grain, as the market will be flooded as soon as prices

Canada is apparently very free from adulterated food. The annual report on adulteration of food issued by the Inland Revenue Department has been distributed. During the year 879 samples were analyzed, and of these 701 were found to be genuine, 87 adulterated, 61 doubtful, 6 sold as compound, 19 not classed and 5 sold

The Postoffice Department has reasoned it out that is will take three years to restore the postal revenue to the normal, depleted as they are by the reduced rate for continental and imperial postage. This seems to be a fair expectation. It will take three years at least to teach people to write more letters, both abroad and to points in their own country.

The commercial agencies and railway men testify to the briskness of trade. Mr. McGuigan, of the G. T. The new Conservative paper, the Halton Standard, issued its first number last Thurs day. It is published at Milson by Mr. Fred B. Elliott, who established and successfully conducted the Burlington Record for three years, and now merger that paper into the new one. The Standard is sprightly, well printed, and its news and editorial master is arranged in very interesting and presentable manner. Mr. Elliott is a first-class printer and s very capable newspaper man. His field at Milton is pretty well circumscribed, and it

remains for the future to reveal which of the three papers now doing business there will be obliged to retire, for Milton is certainly not a three-newspaper town.

Chief Justice Armour has come out flat ly in favor of newspapers publishing full details of police court proceedings. In a case brought against the Ollaws Citizen at the Carleton assizes for publishing a report of a case in which the defendant was alleged to have purchased stolen goods, the jury returned a verdict for the Chizen and Judge Armour in charging the jury said newspapers had a perfect and legitimate right to report the evidence of any case in police or other courts of law. The advantage, he said, derived by the public from these publications far more than compensated for inconvenience to the parties concerned. The newspaper was one of the best preventatives of orime, as the publicity of offences served to put the public on their goard against violation of the peace.






